Americans need assurances that their hopes and needs are being met

The Nov. 3rd election of our neighbour includes approximately 147 million presidential votes already counted by eligible voters for Biden (51%) or Trump (48%). Such voter mobilisation is rare; the momentum is now with Americans for whom decency in politics matters. Many Canadians support their decision.

Trump is probably the most unqualified and unpresidential of his 44 predecessors, ignoring from the outset that his primary duty was to unite Americans behind democracy, equality of opportunity, the rule of law and other modern features of the American constitution. He provided instead a continuous stream of deceit, arrogance, racism, disruption and misogyny.

Another major factor against his re-election was the deaths of

nearly 246,000 Americans from COVID-19, with 126,000 new cases daily currently. Trump's response included inaction, mockery, lies and rejection of mask-wearing and science. As COVID-19 devastated the world economy, many Americans lost their employment-dependent mostly forprofit health care, while at the same time Trump sought to remove Obama's *Affordable Care Act* from millions of families.

Friends of the American people might, however, reflect on the reasons why the election was still relatively close for both the presidency and the Congress, with the latter probably leaving the Senate with a narrow continuing Republican majority. One reason was the loss of many

One reason was the loss of many manufacturing jobs and factories in states like Michigan and Ohio following China's admittance to the World Trade Organization in 2001. When Seattle hosted the WTO glob-

alization talks under the Clinton

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> administration in 1999, more than 40,000 protesters from a coalition of labour unions and environmentalists decried the anticipated loss of jobs to overseas sweatshops and jurisdictions with lax or no pollution standards in a race to a globalized bottom.

Peter Navarro, who ran for elective office five times in California as a Democrat but became Trump's director of trade and marketing policy, estimated in a 2012 documentary that China had caused the loss of 25 million American jobs and 57,000 U.S. factories.

Navarro concluded that most of China's competitive advantage came from unfair trade practices, including pollution, poor labour standards, government subsidies ... "contaminated, defective and cancerous" exports, theft of US intellectual property, and currency manipulation.

Canadians were also victims. In *The Expendables*, published this year, economist Jeff Rubin chronicles losing

some 600,000 manufacturing jobs in Canada - over a quarter of our industrial workforce since 2000. He also notes that barely 2 in 10 Canadian workers are still employed in making things. Roughly half of millennials, the largest segment of our labour force, need a second job to pay their bills.

In short, the Trump administration changed the conversation about Beijing and got some things there right even if it mishandled virtually everything else abroad.

Some ex-pat communities who voted for Trump were persecu-ted mercilessly by China's pre-sident-for-life Xi Jinping: Falun Gong, Uyghur Muslims, Christians, democrats in general, Tibetans and human rights advocates. They support Trump's politics as victims. It's now well-documented that Beijing now and in the past murders prisoners of conscience and sells their vital organs to wealthy Chinese and international organ tourists. American voters of origin in Cuba, Vietnam, Venezuela and other such nations were also attracted to Trump by his constant criticism of Biden-Harris as "socialists/Marxists" Biden and Harris are probably wellpositioned to win many of these voters over if they act firmly but prudently to restore the soul of America internationally. Biden noted in *Foreign Affairs* magazine earlier this year that Trump has "emboldened our adversaries and squandered our leverage to contend with national security challenges from North Korea to Iran, from Syria to Afghanistan to Venezuela with practically nothing to show for it ... (He's) turned away from the demonstrated values that give strength to our nation and unify us as a people."

Adam Schiff, chair of the House Intelligence Committee, correctly summarizes: "Joe Biden's story is one of loss, perseverance and human decency. His victory, and Kamala's, show that in America those qualities still matter. That right still matters. Truth still matters. And decency still matters. Rebuilding won't be quick or easy. Let's get to work."

Americans and democrats globally need more assurances that their hopes and needs are being met effectively by their governments.
